Coming this year should be a letter to allow you to "opt-in" to a new Gateway Division phone directory so you will be able to contact your fellow members for tips, tricks, or to invite them over for an operations session. I found the old directory quite useful and look forward to having an updated version. During our planning meeting the officers discussed and agreed this mailing would be a good opportunity to enclose a brief survey to solicit feedback from the entire membership. Please let us know so we can plan accordingly this year.

The officers also discussed the number of train shows and staffing of our table at the shows. We are going to have our table at several Great Train Expo shows and a couple of smaller popular shows. We tend to have the same volunteers at most of the shows and we feel these few large shows allow us the most exposure to the public to spread the message of the NMRA and reach potential new members.

Also on the agenda was the Model Contest. We have done this now for several years – and last year's number of entries for judging – (3) was disappointing. We cannot justify supplying kits to the members at discounted prices if they aren't being returned for judging. This is one of our larger expenses during the year. The models returned have all been excellent – just not as many as we would like to see.

Lastly fundraising was discussed – should we do a project layout and raffle it at a show or the Fall Meet to raise money to support the division activities? The Division isn't broke – but we haven't had any significant income other than the Fall Meet during the last several years and the reserve is lower than it was several years ago. Based on a preliminary budget Rich worked up we are almost break even, but not quite. Let the officers know what you think would be some good fundraising activities.

Speaking of the Fall Meet - this year it will again be in Missouri, most likely at Trinity Lutheran Church, and a one day show vs. two. Admission is going to be \$7.00 per adult and kids will still be free.

Thanks to all of you who volunteered during 2014 and please help out again

in 2015. The officers appreciate all of the help.





Building a Pair of RR Buildings

Styrofoam Scenery Part 3




A railroad that our round-robin RR group has been working with is a large 3-rail "O" gauge layout. It had a need

for a couple rail siding structures at the end of two spur tracks. Again, it would be packaging Styrofoam to the rescue. Both buildings began as a block of packaging Styrofoam.



A ¾" thick packaging Styrofoam was chosen for the base of the building with the loading platform. It was painted several coats of a light gray latex exterior house paint to represent a concrete foundation. It was covered on top with a sheet of thin corrugated cardboard that was painted and scribed with a marker pen to look like wooden planking. The door steps on the other building were made using Popsicle sticks.



A packaging Styrofoam block was used as the core of each building and then scribed wood siding was glued to each side of the Styrofoam blocks. The loading doors on both buildings were constructed with card board glued under the wood siding and framed with scale lumber. The windows on the building with the loading platform were cut into the siding and glued in place. These were windows from an On₃ structure kit. The Styrofoam block behind the window openings were painted with a mixture of silver and black paint.

The advertising signs were cut from colored prints glued to thin poster board. The Ford sign was cut from a model card advertising flyer, and the Christmas Coke sign was an "O" scale sign from an old "Model Railroader" article.

The building with the loading platform has a sloped roof and the other building





has an off-set peaked roof. Both roofs were made of cardboard and covered with overlapped masking tape to represent rolled roofing. The smoke stacks were made with soda straws painted with a flat black.



This was our way to add structures that would occupy two spur tracks on the edge the layout Again we were able to make use a material that would have ended up as trash or recycled.

2014 Annual Kit Bashing Contest Results

3rd Place Jon Marx

The model is loosely based on the Jim Boyd photo of the Western Maryland depot at Glady, WV (attached for reference) in the Kalmbach publication *How to Kitbash Structures*. I leafed through the book and when I saw that photo I could see the parts from the provided kit find a place in the structure. I flipped the footprint and did not add the bay window or porch along the one-story





section.

To get the windows to look like the photo it was necessary to cut some new openings and add some Grandt Line windows not in the kit. I also cut small windows in gables on each end of the second story. To get the second story, I removed the gables from two end pieces, trimmed the bottom edge from two other pieces and spliced them together. All seams were reinforced with 0.100" square

Evergreen strip styrene. the corners also were reinforced with the same.

At least I finished the kit this time, but not enough left to add better scenery. There's always next year.

2nd Place John Carty
I based this model on
a photograph on the
internet of the
Radium Mine located
on the south side of
Belleville. I
constructed the
supply shed first by



cutting two side walls and splicing them together. I added a front wall and cut the back wall to serve as the remaining sides, cutting the peak off the piece added to the back.

This structure nestles against the backdrop, so the remaining portion of the back wall along with part of the left wall was blanked with sheet styrene after adding a roof using Evergreen metal roofing. I cut the sliding door from styrene siding and added the track

using strip styrene. I added a dock using two front porches and raised the entire structure on posts cut from styrene tubing. The steps are by Central Valley while the stack is from the Grandt Line feed store.

Since I already had a mine with an enclosed head hoist, I opted to scratch build this hoist using Evergreen strip and sheet styrene. The pulley wheels were scavenged from a Walther's coal conveyor kit. I built the



boiler house using a Grandt Line Feed Store by substituting a blank wall cut from Evergreen metal siding for the façade. The lean to from one of the small houses attached to the boiler house serves as the hoist shed. I added a stack from the Gruesome Casket kit.

The mine office is a basic small house constructed per the instructions to which I added the scale from the feed store. I added a Walther's water tower, Design Preservation fuel tank, parts of an Atlas substation, and a pair of outhouses. I used Woodland



Scenics ballasts for gravel and ballast. Unpainted Preiser figures, a pair of custom lettered Accurail hoppers, and a truck from Mini Metals complete the scene along with various details from the parts box.

I sprayed everything a base coat of gray and then added various shades of gray and black. I added a sign printed from Word on paper. The name of the mine is a reference to Snow White

and the Seven Dwarves. Weathering consists of Bragdon powders along with acrylic paints. I tried to make the scene as drab as possible with only the people, truck, and weathering providing color.

1st Place Jeremy Janzen



This model is a typical Kansas two-story farm house to go on the layout that I am building with my dad. I decided to use one front wall, one back wall and 2 side walls from two of the lean-to kits for each end of

the house. I cut off the triangle top of the front and back walls and glued the lean to



walls in between the front wall and the triangle top piece. I repeated this with the back wall. The sides were cut from Evergreen styrene 2080 V groove. The windows are from a Tichy Door and Window assortment which matched the

style of the Grant Line windows. After marking the locations of the windows, I cut them out using an Exacto knife and a straight edge, filing the openings until the windows fit. I then glued the wall sections together without the windows. An addition was added to the side with the remaining lean-to wall and I added a smaller addition to the back of the house with some parts from the outhouse. I added some styrene sticks as braces inside just below the roof line and one at the top of the building running the length of the building to support the roof.

I then primed the building with white spray paint. After the paint had dried I painted the building with Rusteolem Camouflage Green paint. The windows and doors were painted with white spray paint. After all the parts were dry, I added the windows and doors to the building. Then I glued in the glass using the clear styrene in the kit and Micro scale Crystal Klear to adhere it to the windows. One of the large windows on the side of the house is partially open so I had to cut the styrene to accommodate it. The roof was made from four pieces of main roofs from the kit with two of them cut to fit. A chimney from the kit was added on top. The roof was sprayed with Valsper grey primer. The chimney was brush painted with Delta Creamcoat burnt sienna craft paint.



Once drv. the roof was weathered with Pan Pastel pastels black, dark umber, and a light grey using their small applicators. followed with a large applicator to smooth out the colors. The large applicator

was also used to lightly brush some light grey on the walls. I then made a base of blue Styrofoam and painted it with brown craft paint. While the paint was wet, I covered it with Woodland Scenics earth blend and green blend. Some Woodland Scenics fine light grey ballast was sprinkled on for the sidewalks and some Scenic Express ground foam was sprinkled around for some heavier grass. I then lightly sprayed the base with 70% rubbing alcohol and used a small bottle to wet the scenery down with thinned white glue. The house was then pushed down into the base. Two scenic express super trees and a large tree from an Accurail tree kit were planted along with a vine running up the side of the house by the side addition.

WG&FR Access Gate

Like many model railroaders, I have been around long enough to see quite a few layouts.



There are also many different bench work designs and track arrangements. The current trend

seems to be the walk in - around the walls design. This is best from the access standpoint since it allows unlimited entrance/exit. But there are also those who for various reasons do not want to lose the space required to turn trains around at each end of the entrance to a walk in design. Most walk-in layouts have a return loop at each side of the entrance. The use of a duck-under is not a good solution. They limit access and are a hazard to tall folks. A properly designed gate allows easy access without any drawbacks. The key to building a successful gate is in the design and construction.

A good design takes into account not only access, but expansion/contraction,

safety, and ease of maintenance. The gate on my HO scale Webster Groves and Fenton Railroad has all of these features. The design takes into account changes due to temperature and humidity.


The features are as follows:

- A Hinges are standard interior 4 inch length with 4 wood screws in each plate.
- **B** Door latch is standard interior model with European style handicapped handles.
- C Spring tension device is a bolt or roller type as used to remove play from screen doors or as used on sliding doors. This device pushes the door latch mechanism back against the flat side of the latch striker plate. These can be found at most hardware stores in the door hardware parts aisle.
- D This section of track is made from 3/4" plywood. For HO scale, the track roadbed is a piece of wood cut to 3 3/4" X 28" which is strengthened by a piece of 3/4" X 7/8" X 27" long piece of white pine set on edge. See Fig. 1.



The tee section is supported on four pieces of ¼-20 UNC threaded rod. These are set into the top rail of the gate using ¼-20 nut inserts of the type used for leveling legs on furniture. Flat washers and hex nuts are used to attach the roadbed section to the top rail. These four assemblies provide vertical adjustment for the tee section of roadbed. See Fig. 2


E The adjustable track section provides adjustment of the gap between the latch end of the gate



and the fixed track on the layout. This track section is made from an Atlas re-railer / grade crossing which has been modified to allow 1/4" lateral adjustment of the gap at the latch end of the gate.


The Atlas re-railer is permanently attached to the layout on the fixed section of the layout using small wood screws. The section of the rerailer attached to the gate is also attached with four wood screws, but the holes in the re-railer for these four screws are slotted to allow + or – [.125"] 1/8" lateral adjustment.

On the gate end of the re-railer, then a 6" section of Atlas code 100 or code 83 flextrack is added. The ends of the rails are notched vertically 1/2" using a flat file. There



must be one left hand and one right hand slip rail end on each rialto form the expansion joint. One end of the track has slip rail joints on the rerailer section. These mate with corresponding slip rail joints on the fixed track attached to the gate roadbed. See figure 3.

- F The track on the gate must be wired as a separate block. Wires dropped down from the fixed and the adjustable track sections will insure good performance and reliability. These wires must be routed through the hinge post with enough slack to permit the gate to be fully opened. Make sure the holes through the roadbed for the adjustable track section are elongated ½" to allow adjustment.
- G Mechanical interlocks at each end of the fixed track work on the layout prevent accidental crashes off the end of the gate opening. These are made from tortoise switch machines mounted horizontally. Power to operate these is provided through a DPDT limit switch mounted so as to be triggered by the closing or opening of the gate. The stop rods



are made from coat hanger wire .062" diameter. One end is hammered flat for a distance of ¼", then a .031"dia. Hole is drilled in the flat to clear the tortoise activating wire. I use .020" diameter music wire in the tortoise switch machines. A hole is also drilled through the roadbed in the center of two ties to clear the rod. Wire the switch machines to raise the rods when gate is open. See figure 4.

H General Construction: The gate is made from 2 x 4 lumber for the frame. The hinge post and latch post are 4 x 4 lumber. It is important to securely attach both posts to the floor. Concrete anchors or equivalent are required. Another solution is to place a 2 x 6 flat on the floor and attach it with liquid nails.

The gate does not need to go all the way down to the floor. The bottom sill plate on the gate can be centered between the two hinges. This gives plenty of strength and still allows you to crawl under in the event that you need to get out with the gate closed. See figure 5 for general location of components and key to the instructions.

One final note: This gate has been in use since 1995. I have adjusted the



gap at the latch end about once a year. The leveling studs need attention about once a year as well. I added a dehumidifier to my basement after talking to a friend of mine and found it to be a good investment. The drier air eliminates seasonal humidity changes on the layout.



NMRA MCoR Region & Gateway Division

The National Model Railroad Association (NMRA) is a world-wide organization dedicated to all aspects of model railroading. In order to bring the most benefit to its members, the association is subdivided into Regions, and each Region has a number of local Divisions. National dues are \$66 per year, and all members of the NMRA are automatically members of the Region and Division in which they live. The Gateway Division is part of the Mid-Continent Region, which represents Missouri, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Nebraska, and parts of Iowa and Illinois.

The Mid-Continent Region publishes a quarterly bulletin, The *Caboose Kibitzer*, and holds an annual convention meeting that usually includes modeling clinics, local tours of layouts or prototype facilities, and model contests. Annual subscription to the Mid-Continent Region *Caboose Kibitzer* is included with membership at the National level and runs concurrently.
