

We have been invited to participate with Mark Twain Hobby for their customer appreciation day in mid-September. Also, in September we are scheduled to start in person meetings again while working out the bugs of maintaining the virtual connection. Exciting times indeed.

The National Convention (August 6-13) team of John Schindler, Jimmy Ables, Brad Joseph and Bob Amsler should all be heartily congratulated for what they accomplished keeping in mind they have worked on this event since prior to the 2020 originally scheduled date that was canceled due to COVID. Somewhere in the neighborhood of six years is quite a commitment. Additionally, this was the first in person convention since 2019 in Salt Lake City. My personal favorite, the contest room, had over 60 entries on the tables to be judged and 40 plus of those entered received merit award scores. This was a particularly strong showing given the recent trends at national conventions past. No matter which of the above activities the attendees participated in, everyone I talked with seemed to be having a great time.

A strong group of volunteers from within and without of the Division assisted all week. Ron Gawedzinski worked tirelessly to coordinate all the attendees onto tour busses every day. Another great event was the 16th annual Railroad Prototype Modeler's (RPM) Meet in Collinsville the last Friday and Saturday in July. Organized and presented by a small group of Gateway Division members, the St. Louis RPM meet has become the premier RPM event in the country. This year, all rolled into the 28,000 square foot event, were over 650 attendees, more than 3,000 models displayed, and 69 premium vendors and Historical Societies were on hand. Also offered were some very interesting presentations. It was well worth the drive across the river and the entry fee for two days of model railroad nirvana.

Even though this is not an official Gateway Division event, the Gateway Division is proud to be able to be a co-sponsor and provide volunteers to support the efforts of Lonnie Bathurst, Dave Roeder, Jeff Kuebler, Brian McQuitty and Mark Lewis in their efforts. You may ask if it is not an official Division event why do we assist them? They are all Division members working to fulfill one of the basic tenants of the NMRA, which is to promote the hobby of Model Railroading. Therefore, it makes sense to support them.

Achievement Program Update: It's Time to Stretch

Greetings from the office of the Achievement Program (AP) Chair. Speaking of Chairs, it seems like I have been doing a lot of sitting these days, either at my desk or driving a car. It's probably time for a stretch for both my body and my mind. How about you?

Several folks in the Gateway Division have been stretching their skills in the NMRA Achievement Program during the last few months. In September we presented AP awards in Electrical Engineering to Glenn Koproske, Greg Gramlich and myself; I also received the Association Volunteer award. David Lowell received an AP award for Association Official and three Merit Awards for pieces of his rolling stock. Greg also received his Golden Spike award. Finally, a few other AP "Statements of Qualification" (SOQs) have been submitted and are going up the approval chain.

Seven members of the Gateway Division are currently stretching by working together toward AP certificates in structures. In early September our "Working Group" held a Zoom meeting where we shared some of the structures we completed and what we learned in the process. Since the certificate requires that 6 structures be evaluated and awarded Certificates of Merit, we reviewed how structures are reviewed for construction, detail, conformity, finish, and scratchbuilding. Several of us who have gone through the evaluation process shared lessons learned.


Layout Description from the Gateway 2022 National Convention Time Table

The Sugar Creek Valley Railroad is and old-school DC powered HO scale layout built from 2007 to 2009. The 75-ft of mainline is code 100 track and is built for error-free operation. The SCVRR is a fictional bridge line from Louisville to Kansas City and Omaha. The layout represents St. Louis Division operations that is heavy on urban switching. The layout is set in September 1966 and features first and early second-generation locomotives, cabooses, and rolling stock with roofwalks and ladders. All rolling stock is weathered. There are many scratchbuilt and kitbashed structures. Monthly five-person crew operating sessions have been held since June 2009.














Arby's Isn't the Only One Who Has the "Meets"

The crackle of static comes through his headset. The tail end of a distant transmission is heard saying "roll-by looks good, have a safe trip," just as the dispatcher was tapping the touchscreen computer monitor that unselects the remote radio towers located along his territory. Now the dispatcher won't hear the endless chatter from train crews out doing their work until the next time someone tones up and needs something. This is just another day in "the chair" coordinating rail movements along the 18-mile UPSF Argentine Subdivision. It's going to be a busy day as trains are trying to get from point A to point B, maintenance crews needing Track-and-Time to solder a broken feeder wire, yard crews who can't find the cars on their switchlists, and the superintendent hollering "food's ready, stop what you're doing and come eat!"


On this particular day, things have been going smoothly. Amtrak has been using these new Siemens Charger locomotives. Today's power was a state owned IDTX 4618. They were running late as usual so the dispatcher decided to hold them at Frisco while they made their station stop. This gave a westbound train led by UP 8095 a chance to slip into the siding and not delay the



passengers any more than they already were. As soon as the rear of 8095's train was clear of the OS at CP 258, the dispatcher was ready to line switch #23 and request a route east for 4618.


Thanks to CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch), this task is as simple as clicking the number next to the switch icon and blue triangle next to the desired signal icon. CAD includes interlocking logic to help prevent human error. If a route is already allocated through a control point (CP), no switch can be thrown or conflicting signal can be cleared that is part of the allocated route. Allocated routes

change the track lines to green, and show an arrow indicating the direction of travel. If a segment of track is occupied, the track lines will be red. An occupied OS (the section of track between the absolute home signals) will not allow the CAD to throw a switch underneath a train.



This type of CTC control system is primarily intended to get trains across the railroad with a few computer mouse clicks. The interface the dispatcher views is overly simplified to what is actually going on with the signal and track detection hardware. The dispatcher does not need to be concerned with the individual aspects of each signal along the way. As such, the signal icons on the interface only report two states, cleared and held. The CAD actually controls the aspects based on the signal rules being used, and local track conditions. Additionally, since intermediate signals at locations between control points operate automatically, they are not controlled by the dispatcher and therefore not shown on the CAD.

A short time later the peace and quite in the dispatcher's office is disrupted as the radio icon alerts him to a call waiting on channel 9, which is used on the branch line. "UPSF Joint Line dispatcher answering Flora tower, over," he says into the microphone. "CNW 8701 East, we're coming down the hill and



looking to get a light at Martin Junction, over," the crew responds. 8701 is leading a 25 car manifest train. The dispatcher needs to keep on his toes as most of the passing sidings are not long enough to accommodate such long trains. A quick glance and he can see that the local is out working an industry between CP 247 and CP 245. The dispatcher has been at this job for several years now, and knows that crew should be on the move any moment. Checking another computer screen, the local just has a few cars and will easily fit at Starr. Ah, with any luck, there will be a well-timed meet. "CNW 8701, I'm rolling the switch now, look to meet one at Starr, over," he says as he locks in the route.

On the main now, the crew of 8701 can see the signal at CP 248 is showing Approach. "CNW 8701 East, Approach signal CP 248, Out," the conductor announces over the radio. The engineer sets some air with the train brakes expecting to stop short of the next signal. The signal at CP 247 is not yet in view. Just then, the headlight of GMTX 427 comes around the curve,



thankfully in siding! The dispatcher sees the local has made it all the way into the siding. He quickly lines the switch at CP 247 back for the main, and requests a route east for 8701. The CAD takes a

few seconds to check for conflicts. The signal at CP 247 comes into view to the crew of 8701. To their anticipation, the signal is showing a Stop indication. That's alright, because the skilled engineer set just enough air to bring the train to a safe stop if needed. Just then the conductor perks up. "Clear signal," he says to the engineer. The CAD was able to lock in a route before 8701 came to a complete stop. The sound of hissing air fills the cab as the engineer knocks off the brakes and grabs a couple of notches on the throttle.

The dispatcher is pleased with the efficiency of CAD. Prior to this system being installed on the UPSF Joint Line, train crews had to shout across the room letting others know their location and direction. A couple of years later, FRS radios were introduced, and an attempt was made to dispatch the main track with Track Warrants. That caused the dispatcher's voice to become hoarse with the constant transmitting with so many trains operating at one time. It didn't take much convincing to the superintendent that a CTC signal system would really enhance operations on the layout. A couple of PowerPoint presentations later, a plan was formulated to upgrade the main track with detection and signals. That's a good thing, because the superintendent did say the food was ready. And now the dispatcher can spend more time eating!




An overview of the entire Argentine Subdivision the dispatcher is responsible for.






Response Rate

The Gateway Division has approximately 220 members, of which 186 members have valid e-mail addresses. We received 63 response of the 186 electronic surveys e-mailed to our members resulting in a 34% response rate. This response rate is similar to our prior surveys.


IF YOU DO NOT ATTEND MEETINGS REGULARLY.






Virtual Meetings

ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF IN-PERSON AND ZOOM HYBRID MEETINGS? No 11%




WHAT DEVICE DO YOU USE TO CONNECT TO ZOOM MEETINGS?




Saturday Meetings

WOULD YOU LIKE TO HAVE ONE MEETING PER QUARTER ON A SATURDAY?




SHOULD THE SATURDAY MEETING TAKE THE PLACE OF THE NORMAL MONTHLY MEETING?



SHOULD WE INVITE OTHERS OUTSIDE OF OUR DIVISION TO OUR MEETINGS?



SHOULD THE DIVISION SET UP A MEMBERS ONLY GROUP ON FACEBOOK?








The Franklin Pacific Railroad includes the Missouri Pacific (Mopac) and the St. Louis San Francisco (Frisco) railroads and the fictional Franklin Pacific Railroad. The tri-level HO scale layout represents trackage in Missouri from Kansas City and Springfield in the west to St. Louis in the east. The railroad includes a staging area, a Franklin, MO interchange yard, and four switching districts. The era is 1958 and trains are controlled by timetable and train order via a dispatcher and station operators. Car forwarding is by car cards and waybills. Scenery on the layout is 100% complete and Digitrax DCC powers the layout. *Editors note: The layout is scheduled to be dismantled after the National Convention.*




Station to Station: Tamms, Illinois

Station to Station is a regular feature that highlights depots and stations in the Gateway Division whether they still exist or have since faded into history.

Built in 1899, this unique, curved depot served both C&El and GM&O passengers in Tamms, Illinois until 1955. The two railroads crossed directly in front of the depot, and the center portion of the depot was used by employees of both railroads. The depot was used sparingly from 1955 to 1971 and then came under threat of demolition in 1975. The village of Tamms could not reach an agreement to save the structure as the railroads



wanted the building moved off of their property. Finally, the village reached an agreement to buy the depot in 1982 without having to move it. The village completed restoration on the depot in 1986 and began using it as their village hall. Later that same year it was placed on the National Register of Historic Places. The Missouri Pacific officially abandoned their tracks in the early 1980s and the last Illinois Central Gulf train passed through Tamms in 1985. Tamms is located in Alexander County in Southern Illinois.





Editor's Observations: Connections

I've been a member of the NMRA since 2005 but this year's convention in St. Louis was only my third national convention. I went to the National conventions in Kansas City in 2018 and in Salt Lake City in 2019. Once I discovered what really happens at these conventions by attending the one held in Kansas City, I was over the moon. Up until that point, I had no idea what to expect. I always thought that the national conventions were attended by modelers who were more skilled or advanced than I was or who were only interested in segments of the hobby that did not appeal to me. Nothing could be further than the truth. What I discovered is that the convention is simply a large group of people from across the country (and the world) who have one thing in common: a passion for model railroading.

I am compiling my thoughts 2 days after the end of the convention so that my impressions are fresh in my mind. So how did the St. Louis 2022 convention compare to the others I've attended? It was different. Not "good different" or "bad different", just different. And what was different? The simple answer is "me." At my first convention I did a little bit of everything from clinics to Modeling with the Masters to prototype tours to layout tours. In Salt Lake City, I switched it up a bit and did more layout and non-rail tours and less prototype tours. For St. Louis, my primary focus was on layout tours, and my goodness, did I ever see some awe-inspiring work. The difference in "me" from my first convention to the St. Louis convention also lies within the fact that I am more comfortable. I am more comfortable knowing that not everyone is at the same modeling level or tries to impose the "right way to model" on anyone. I am more comfortable that I am seeing familiar faces, and not just the people in our own division. I am more comfortable knowing that it is not a group of "insiders" who shun "outsiders." It is an assembly of people who simply have a passion of the hobby.

I could run down a list of what all that went right and the few things that could have used improvement at the convention; however, as someone who has organized (agonized might be a better word) over a 1-day event with 300 attendees, I have a great deal of appreciation for those organizers and volunteers who handled this convention for a much larger number over an entire week. As such, I do not dwell on what did not go as expected because there is bound to be issues when you are dealing with hundreds of moving parts mostly involving humans. Overall, I was very satisfied with the convention. Thanks to everyone who made it happen!

With the flood of cherished memories of days gone by that filled my mind, that moment was worth the price of admission.

Instead, I would rather talk about my takeaways from this convention. As I look back at the past week of the National convention, all of my thoughts center around one common denominator: connections. Certainly, the most obvious connection is with other model railroaders. They may model differently than I do and they may have different interests within the hobby than I do, but we share the commonality of our love for trains. It was great to finally meet people in-person when I've only seen them on Zoom until now. It was great to reconnect with those I've met in the past whether at a hobby shop, train show, or at a prior convention. It was great to meet new people who share the same interest in our hobby.


I also feel a greater connection to St. Louis. I live about two hours away but I frequently attend concerts and ballgames and shop in St. Louis; however, I went to different areas of the city and greater metropolitan area where I've never been. I met many new faces on the layout tours and that gives me a heightened appreciation for

St. Louis by interacting with those who call it home. In addition, by taking the TRRA excursion, I now have the memories of crossing the Mississippi on a train and seeing the St. Louis skyline from a bridge where I've seen countless trains cross. After that excursion, as I cross the Mississippi over the Poplar Street Bridge, I will now glance over with the memories of taking a train over the MacArthur.

Attending the National Convention is not only about trains (at least for me it isn't). It is also about connecting with my other interests, such as travel, Cardinals baseball, and music. While in town, I made my way to 2 Cardinals games (something I haven't done since before the pandemic) and also to some record stores. I tried numerous restaurants I had never been to before. So, for me, the National Convention is an excuse to connect with the destination and feed some of my other interests. As a side note, when I go to Busch Stadium I generally sit on the top row along the first base side of the stadium. It is shady and there always seems to be a breeze even on the hottest days. I can also watch trains go by. So even with Cardinals baseball I can make a connection to railfanning.

Because of the convention, I feel a greater connection to the hobby. I was able to trade ideas with other modelers, pick their brains about very specific things (such as the C&IM...thanks, David), and also share information about coal mines in Illinois (albeit I am no expert on the subject by any stretch of the imagination) to an attendee who had no idea that Illinois sits on top of huge coal reserves. I also spoke with many vendors at the National Train Show not only about new products, but also other happenings in the industry. And did I mention those fantastic layouts? To be able to see in person what I've only seen in the model railroad press was incredible.

Finally, Michael Gross, the keynote speaker at the closing banquet, eloquently summed up his connection to the hobby, which is also the same connection that many of us have. He told the story of he and his grandfather sitting on an empty baggage wagon at the depot to watch trains pass by. In his world, and in mine, model railroading is also a connection to the past. It is a connection to fond memories of family, friends, and my hometown. Mr. Gross' heartfelt story flooded my memories with my connections to my past with my grandpa helping me with my Lionel trains in his basement or the days he would take me down to the tracks to watch trains. He would always have me count the number of cars in the train. At the time I didn't realize that he was teaching me to count. What better way to engage a youngster in learning than connecting it to something that is of interest. Content Needed for the RPO

The RPO is looking for content for our newsletter. That content can range from full articles to short half-page articles to interesting photos. As long as the subject relates to trains or model railroading, you're good.

Assistance with Articles: Are you uncomfortable writing an article? That's OK. We can help. It may take a little longer to get published based on deadlines, but we can help you write your article. Just reach out and we can work on your ideas together.

Photos: You do not have to be a professional photographer to get your photos in the newsletter. We know that photography can be intimidating, but having an expensive camera or photostacking software is nice but not required. With the advancement of cell phone cameras, you can take pictures that we can use in the RPO. Just make sure they are not blurry. Also know that your depth of field will not be as good as it would be with a digital camera and/or photostacking software although some new cell cameras are getting really advanced. Also, if taking photos of your layout or models, it is better not to use the flash. The flash creates harshness in both colors and shadows in your photos, so take the photos without the flash if you can. Just make sure your subject is well-lit. As a tip, if you take an indoor photo with your cell phone without the flash, make sure to stage your subject. By not using the flash, things in motion (such as a train running on a layout) tend to be blurry and unusable. Finally, with all photos, be sure to provide the credit for who took the photo and a caption to describe what we are seeing.

Copyrights: Make sure that the work you are submitting is your own. If necessary, use quotations and attributions for content not your own. Plagiarism is never acceptable. Another example of a copyright issue is Google. Google Earth or Earth Studio can be used for purposes of research, education, film, and nonprofit use without needing permission. If you are following Google's terms of services and you're attributing properly, you can use their maps and imagery; however, you cannot use Google Street View imagery in print without permission from Google. In regards to photos, make sure that the photos you are submitting are your own or by permission of those who hold the copyright. Just because you found a photo on the internet does not mean you can use it. If you are using someone else's photo, we will need verification that they have granted permission for you to use the photo. None of us at the RPO are copyright attorneys, so please make it easy on us with your submissions.

Topics: So, like we said, we are looking for content. The following are some ideas to jumpstart your creativity:

- Articles on prototype railroads (including operations, locomotives, passenger, and rolling stock), industries, towns, and structures
- A photo tour of your layout
- A project you are currently working on (not everything has to be in its final finished form to be interesting).
- Photos from a railfanning event or from a visit to a railroad museum
- How-to articles on layout construction, DCC, scenery, trackwork, layout design, painting/ decaling/weathering, and layout operation to name just a few possible how-to topics

Those are just some ideas. Don't limit yourself to that list. We want to use the RPO to educate our members and also to give all of you an outlet to show off your accomplishments, whether it be related to prototype or modeling. As long as the topic involves trains or model railroading, the options are wide-open. Submission information is on the last page of this newsletter.

Meeting Minutes for July 18, 2022

Business Meeting:

Superintendent Willie Richter called the Zoom meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. A reminder was given that meeting may be recorded. He also mentioned that attendees need to state their name when speaking and to mute their lines to prevent background noise when not speaking.

New Members/Visitors Recognition

Willie Richter asked if there were any new members or visitors attending the meeting. There was one new member at the meeting (Craig Stiegemeir).

Membership Report

David Lowell reported that the Division has 220 members and the Region has 865 members. The numbers have been stable. Dan Knipp asked about the dues allocation from the Region. Mr. Lowell reported that the Division has not yet received the allocation as National will not distribute any funds to the Region until 100% of the Divisions in the Region update their numbers.

Financial Reports

Willie Richter presented the May 2022 financial statement. There was only one transaction during the month which was interest earned on the Division bank account.

Minutes from the June 20, 2022 Meeting

Willie Richter presented the minutes from the June 20, 2022 meeting. The minutes were approved as presented.

Old Business

Convention Update: Jim Ables provided an update of the 2022 convention. Mr. Ables reported that Eric Brooman is withdrawing from the layout tours and K-10 has been added to the layout tours. Mr. Ables encouraged Divisions members to attend the convention. Mr. Ables also requested volunteers for the convention. Dave Ackmann asked how many have registered for the convention. Mr. Ables reported that there are approximately 600 total registrants including spouses/partners and children. Mr. Ables believes travel costs and COVID are impacting registration numbers. Venita Lake asked for assistance with her layout during the layout tours. Carl Wessel asked if he gets credit towards the convention for his time running the streetcar for the convention attendees at the museum. Mr. Ables reported that Mr. Wessel needs to send him an e-mail with the number of hours. Mr. Ables further stated that layout owners need to report layout helpers to him and that the members would be credit towards registration fee or to the Division. Joe Visintine expressed his disappointment in the number of cancelled activities. Mr. Ables noted that many activities had to be cancelled as no one was signing up for them and that for a bus to run requires approximately 50% of the seats to be sold.

Local Presenters: Dan Knipp reported that local presenters are needed for the return to the hybrid in -person/Zoom meetings. Mr. Knipp noted that in the past 2 years, only 6 Division members conducted presentations with the remainder being visitors or recordings. Dave Ackmann, a Division member, is scheduled to present in September at the first hybrid in-person/Zoom meeting. His topic will be related to a new way to create models with 3D printing. Mr. Ackmann will be doing this presentation for NMRAx and at the National convention.

Election Committee: Dale DeWitt reported that he, Hank Kraichely, and Don Head are the Nominations/Elections committee. The first meeting was held on July 9, 2022 and they have their agenda for the tasks that need to be completed. The candidate selection process will begin on September 1, 2022. On October 1, the committee will close the nominations process and report on the candidates interested in the positions. The committee will develop the election process based

on the number of nominations received. Mr. DeWitt is keeping Mr. Richter informed of the committee's activities and progress.

New Business

July Board Meeting Report: Willie Richter reported that the July Board meeting was held on July 11, 2022 and that the Board discussed the Division survey results, in-person meetings, and investing part of the treasury. The Clerk, Jeff Cooper, noted that the minutes for the Board meeting had not been prepared and submitted at the time of this meeting. Dave Ackmann volunteered to go to the church in advance of the first hybrid meeting in September to assist with testing the equipment. Jim Ables reported that he is hoping to do the testing at both the church and VFW and he would let Mr. Ackmann know when it is scheduled.

Kirkwood Gathering: Glenn Koproske asked when the Kirkwood gathering was going to be during the convention. David Lowell reported that it was Tuesday evening and will start around 6 p.m. **Christmas Party:** Glenn Koproske asked if there was going to be a Division Christmas party this year. Willie Richter indicated that it is unlikely for 2022 and that there would be further discussion when reviewing the survey results.

RPM: Dan Knipp reported that the RPM is still looking for volunteers to assist with the event. Jim Ables offered to send out an e-mail to the Division members.

Presentation

Dan Knipp presented the results from the Division member survey. Highlights of the results are as follows:

- There were 63 responses out of 186 valid e-mail addresses of the 220 Division members. It was a 34% return rate which is about the typical response rate.
- 46% of the respondents do not regularly attend meetings with 36% stating they do not attend due to other commitments, 15% stating it is too far to drive, and 12% stated they simply do not want to attend.
- 88% of the respondents are in favor of doing hybrid meetings
- 86% of the respondents are in favor of having quarterly in-person events on a Saturday with 64% stating that the quarterly in-person event should take place of the monthly meeting.
- 73% of the respondents want presentations on model railroad operation sessions, 73% want
 presentations on scenery topics, 60% would like to see weathering presentations, DCC topics
 came in at 56%, and layout design is favored by 52% of the respondents. Other presentation
 topics included photography, contest judging, signaling, prototype operations, and the
 achievement program.
- 25% of the respondents said they would do presentations and another 43% said maybe. Mr.
 Knipp noted there have been 6 Division members do presentations in the past 2 years with 15 to
 16 visitors or recordings. Mr. Knipp commented that we would be better off if our own members
 would do presentations.

- 86% of the respondents would like to go on layout tours, 70% would like to see the return of the
 Fall meet, 66% are in favor of train show attendance, 65% would like to go on prototype tours,
 and 60% would like to participate in operating sessions. Mr. Knipp noted that historically the
 Division has had difficulty in getting volunteers for the Fall Meet and Train Shows. Other activities
 mentioned include preparing layouts for operations, model contests, railfan photo safaris, swap
 meets, and show-and-tell presentations.
- 27% of the respondents said they would assist with the activities with another 51% said they might assist with the activities. Mr. Knipp noted that we will need more help if we are going to do more activities and specifically mentioned that we need a chairperson to run the Saturday events.
- Support for a Facebook Group was very low so the Division will not purse setting up the group.
- The majority of the respondents indicated that 2 hours is the right length of time for member meetings.
- 79% of the respondents are in favor of inviting members from outside of the Division to our meetings.
- 68% of the respondents are in favor of charging members lower fees than non-members for shows and meets.
- Suggestions for making membership more valuable include increasing the number of in-person
 meetings, more hand on clinics/presentations, more social interaction, shorter business meetings,
 sessions for those with less than MMR skills, creating a membership map/directory, working with
 the Boy Scouts, virtual bull sessions, and ensure regular updates to the website, newsletter, and
 Facebook. Mr. Ables noted that the there are strict guidelines regarding privacy and a
 membership map/directory. Members would have to opt-in for the Division to share information.

Upon reporting the survey results, the members in attendance discussed the results and offered suggestions including:

- Having the Division booth at train shows an include the timesaver layout and members doing actual live modeling.
- Having in-person Saturday meetings with hands-on activities. Discussions included possible locations.
- Re-starting the Model Railroading 101 and 102 programs.
- Mr. Ackmann requested the raw data from the survey. Mr. Knipp and Mr. Ables will de-identify
 the results and get the data to Mr. Ackmann. Mr. Ackmann suggested that we personally solicit
 those respondents who stated that they would or might do presentations to encourage them to
 do so.
- Mr. Ackmann offered to coach members on how to do presentations. It was also mentioned that we may want to do a presentation on how to do presentations.
- Mr. DeWitt reported that he and Bill Linson would be willing to get the membership directory updated.
- Mr. Head stated that the past trips to the UP shops and Monticello Railway museum were
 excellent and would look forward to those types of activities and also in-person meetings.
- Mr. Miller that he could possibly present a session on animation in January (approximately) and a session on scenery/trees/shrubs in March or April.
- Mr. Beckman encouraged all in attendance to volunteer to do just one thing and that it would make a big difference.
- Mr. Wessel encourage members to revisit the content from James Kanbb's presentation on getting new members and engaging members.

- Mr. Ackmann noted that the Division has 220 members and we have about 10% attend the Zoom meetings. Mr. Ables noted that historically the largest in-person meeting for the Division was about 40 people.
- Mr. Ables noted that technology is a barrier to many.
- Mr. Oestreich said he is willing to lead a show-and-tell presentation regaled to last year's Big Boy visit but would need help with the presentation.
- Ms. Lake requested that the comments from the survey be made available. Mr. Ables reported that he will attempt to distribute them.
- Mr. Ackmann recommended the Board make 3 to 5 SMART (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant and Time-bound) goals and keep membership updated on the goals and progress.

Mr. Richter closed the discussion period with noting that getting back to in-person meetings in September is very important and that changes will be forthcoming in the Division. He stated that these changes will take planning and time to implement, but the Board is interested in bringing more value to the members.

<u>Next Meeting:</u> Willie Richter announced the next meeting will be August 15, 2022 through Zoom and the clinic/presentation is still to be determined.

Adjourn: Willie Richter adjourned the meeting at 8:31 p.m.

Meeting Minutes for September 19, 2022

Business Meeting:

Superintendent Willie Richter called the Zoom meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. A reminder was given that meeting may be recorded. He also mentioned that attendees need to state their name when speaking and to mute their lines to prevent background noise when not speaking. Mr. Richter announced that this is our first in-person/Zoom hybrid meeting and participants need to speak one at a time so that the virtual participants can hear and understand what is being said.

New Members/Visitors Recognition

Willie Richter asked if there were any new members or visitors attending the meeting. There were 5 first-time attendees.

Minutes from the July 18, 2022 Meeting

Willie Richter presented the minutes from the July 18, 2022 meeting. *Dale DeWitt moved and Ron Gawedzinski* seconded approval of the July 18, 2022 regular Division meeting minutes. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

Financial Reports

Bill Levin presented the August 2022 financial statement. Mr. Levin noted that we received the deposit back from the Kirkwood Depot, we earned interest of \$6.05, and there were expenses of \$119.88 related to the website and \$25 for State of Missouri corporate registration fees. Jim Ables noted that the 2022 convention organizers are working on closing out the convention and the payment related to Division volunteers will be coming soon. Glenn Koproske asked how funds from the 2001 convention were used and Mr. Ables explained how the funds have been used over the years. In addition, Mr. Ables noted that the Division received approximately \$10,000 from the disbursement of the Don Ayers estate a few years ago. Bob Miller moved and Dave Roeder seconded approval of the August 2022 financial report. The motion was carried by unanimous vote.

Old Business

Local Presenters: Willie Richter noted that local presenters are needed. The Division will begin quarterly hands-on clinics on Saturdays in 2023 and 3 to 4 presenters will be needed for each quarterly event.

Election Committee: Dale DeWitt reported that he, Hank Kraichely, and Don Head are close to finalizing the nominations process for the Superintendent and Paymaster positions. All members received either an e-mail or paper notice requesting nominations. The nomination process will close September 22nd. Mr. DeWitt will forward the nominations to the Clerk. Based on the number of nominations, the Board will have to decide whether a formal election will be necessary or if the process can be handled by acclamation if there is only one nominee for each open position.

New Business

Convention Wrap-up: Jim Ables provided the post-convention update to the membership. Mr. Ables thanked all the volunteers who assisted with the convention. He reported there were between 700 and 800 attendees with a large number of walk-up registrations. He reported that there were no major difficulties encountered. Finally, the organizers are in the process of closing out the convention and the payment to the Division for the volunteers will be forthcoming.

RPO Newsletter Editor: Willie Richter announced that the Division Clerk, Jeff Cooper, will be taking

Achievement Award Certificate Presentations and Program Update: David Ackmann, Achievement Program Chair, presented Greg Gramlich with his certificate for Electrical Engineering and his Golden Spike Award. Mr. Ackmann presented Glenn Koproske with his certificate for Electrical Engineering and David Lowell his certificate for Association Official. Mr. Lowell presented Mr. Ackmann his certificates for Electrical Engineering and Association Volunteer. Mr. Ackmann noted that a workgroup has been formed to work on the Structures certificate and there are currently 5 participants. The group met virtually in mid-September. Any Division members who are interested in earning their Structures certificate are welcome to join the workgroup, as well as anyone who is simply interested in learning more. Lifetime Achievement Award: The Lifetime Achievement Award presentation was tabled and will be conducted at a future meeting.

RPM: Dave Roeder noted that the Collinsville RPM, which is the largest RPM in the U.S., held their annual meet in July. There were over 650 paid attendees, over 3,000 models, and 69 vendors and historical societies. There were 2 layout tours and Mr. DeWitt took photographs at the meet. Mr. Roeder noted that the meet occupied 28,000 square feet and additional volunteers will be needed in 2023 since the space is so large. Mr. Roeder thanked the Division for recruiting their members to be volunteers at the meet and presented the Division with a check for the volunteer time.

50/50 Drawing: Tom Gaffuri won the 50/50 drawing and received \$26.

Equipment for Hybrid Meetings: Jim Ables noted that to improve the hybrid format of our meetings the Division will need to purchase a second laptop and a pan/tilt/zoom camera. Mr. Ables requested authorization to spend up to \$800 for the equipment. Discussion amongst the membership ensued and Mr. Ables was asked if \$800 was enough. Mr. Ables and Mr. Richter noted that we are taking an incremental approach so that we do not end up buying equipment that we don't need and that we piece together the right types of equipment. The motion for Mr. Ables to spend up to \$800 to purchase equipment to improve virtual meetings was carried by unanimous vote.

Presentation

Dave Ackmann presented *Automating CAD For Model Railroad Structures Using "Generators."*When it comes to building structures for your model railroad, many basic items like walls and roofing contain regularly repeating objects. 3D printing makes the creation of repeating objects easier than traditional methods, but using standard Computer Aided Design to create an exact model of what is desired can be problematic. In this clinic Dave Ackmann presented how he developed computer programs to design such objects (shake shingles, windows and many more), allowing him to specify design parameters and then automatically calculate a precise 3D model to his specifications, all without having to learn or use a traditional CAD package. The programs are available for free. You no longer need great manual dexterity to create many 3D structure models.

Feedback on the First Division Hybrid Meeting: Willie Richter asked those on Zoom how well the first hybrid meeting went. Virtual attendees reported that for the most part the hybrid meeting worked well and considered the first run to be a success. Recommendations included the need for additional microphones and virtual members requested that attendees speak one at a time and limit side conversations as the microphones pick up everyone talking. It was requested that whomever is speaking state their name as sometimes they are not in view of the camera and those online cannot tell who is speaking. Zoom participants also need to mute their lines as background noise interfered with hearing the in-person meeting.

<u>Next Meeting:</u> Willie Richter announced the next meeting will be October 17, 2022. The in-person site will be at the VFW in O'Fallon, IL and a Zoom link will be emailed to those members who cannot attend in person. The clinic/presentation is still to be determined.
